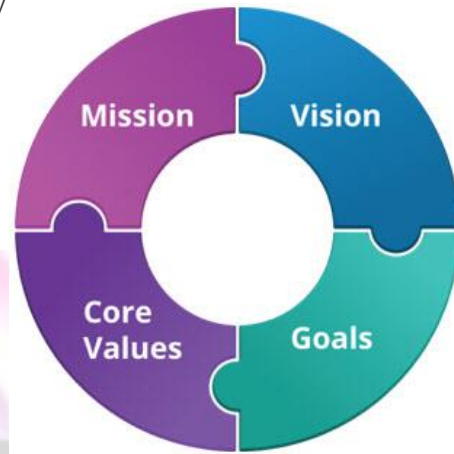

## *New Board Members*

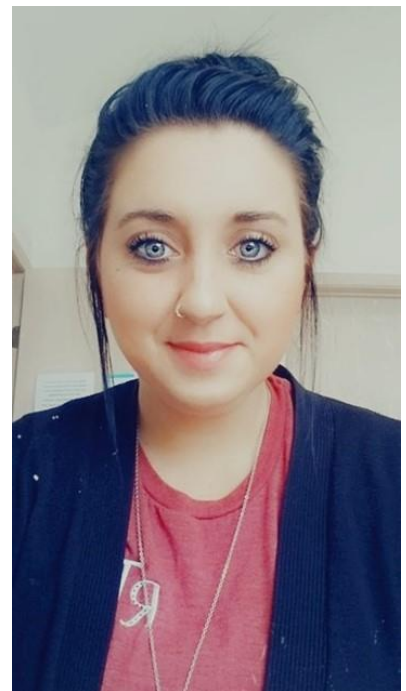
### **Silvia Hernandez**

I have worked for the Huron County Sheriff's Office for almost 10 years and am assigned to the Road Patrol division. I joined the Board to continue to help the citizens of Huron County, where I have lived most of my life. I have a wide range of experience from the Sheriff's Office which includes 5 years as a School Resource Officer and a Corrections Officer, on top of being on patrol for the last 7 years. This experience helps me bring a different perspective to the Board because I have witnessed the struggles in our community on a daily basis. I'm excited to be a part of MHAS and can't wait to see all the great things we can do for the community in the future.”



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## *Community Initiatives*

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### **Grant Applications**

In an effort to bring additional funds and services into the county to fill the various gaps that have been identified, MHAS staff applied for six grant funding opportunities in FY 2021, increasing its revenue by \$1,055,741.63. The entirety of this funding was utilized to improve and expand behavioral health services and supports in Huron County.

MHAS submitted grant applications for the following opportunities in FY 2021:

- **SOR 2.0 Innovations:** MHAS was awarded \$483,209.88 in SOR 2.0 Innovations funding from the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (OhioMHAS). The funding assisted in the expansion of technology utilization to manage co-occurring substance use disorder (SUD) and mental health conditions by reducing barriers to telehealth services, reducing relapse and overdose, reducing recidivism, increasing access to services, and increasing collaboration amongst community partners.
- **SOR 2.0 and SOR 1.0 No Cost Extension (NCE):** MHAS was awarded \$448,518.98 in SOR 2.0 and SOR 1.0 NCE funding from OhioMHAS that was utilized to increase access to peer recovery support services, reduce transportation barriers, expand recovery housing, fund Drug Free Workplace trainings for Huron County employers, provide PPE for the four participating organizations, implement contingency management to improve likelihood of success for individuals involved in treatment services, and expand Recovery Navigator services to all three treatment providers.
- **SOR 2.0 Training:** MHAS was awarded \$154,000.00 in SOR 2.0 Training funding which provided access to Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) training for clinicians at the Board's three contracted treatment providers. Dialectical behavior therapy (DBT) is a modified type of cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT). Its main goals are to teach individuals how to regulate their emotions, live mindfully and in the moment, develop healthy ways to cope with stress, and improve their relationships with others.
- **Capital funding:** MHAS was awarded \$212,500.00 in Capital Funding from OhioMHAS. This funding, which required a match of \$212,500.00 utilizing levy reserve funding, was utilized to purchase a duplex in Norwalk which will be used as a women's recovery house. Recovery housing supports a person in their commitment to sobriety by focusing on improving their physical, emotional, relational, and spiritual health and the environment in which this process takes place is essential to achieving long term recovery. The home will house up to 8 women who are seeking recovery from substance use disorders and will help them become productive members of their community by providing housing and additional supports.
- **Ohio Overdose Prevention Network Grant (OPN):** MHAS was awarded funding through the Ohio Overdose Prevention Network that assisted in: increasing capacity and support for overdose spike planning and plan implementation, the creation of a Community Response Plan (which includes the new Huron County Overdose Alert), increasing timely access to substance use and opioid use disorder services and supports which include education and access to medication assisted treatment, and increasing recovery supports and peer services to include education and distribution of Naloxone to reduce unintentional overdose deaths. Three main objectives were addressed during the grant cycle; implementation of a Huron County Project Dawn site, creation of an educational campaign for medication assisted treatment, and expansion of the Huron County Quick Response Team.

- **SPF Grant:** The Huron County MHAS Board received the Strategic Prevention Framework - Partnerships for Success (SPF-PFS) grant in partnership with Sandusky, Seneca, and Wyandot Counties. The purpose of this grant program is to prevent the onset and reduce the progression of substance abuse and its related problems while strengthening prevention capacity and infrastructure at the community level. The program is intended to address underage drinking and marijuana use among persons aged 9 to 20.

## **Workforce Initiative**

In 2020, MHAS began a new initiative called “Mental Health and Addiction in the Workplace”. The goal of this outreach was to briefly educate employers on the importance of addressing mental health and addiction in the workplace, provide them with local resources available and open the door to further conversation on how to help employers and employees. MHAS has continued this effort with various outreach attempts to local businesses and construction companies, as well as partnering with Norwalk Economic Development Corporation (NEDC) to provide a virtual presentation on the topic to employers. MHAS will continue this initiative in 2022, however, the focus will shift slightly from simply providing education and resources, to assisting employers in reviewing company policies and establishing a plan to create “Recovery Friendly Workplaces” throughout Huron County. MHAS plans to work closely with local economic development organizations to accomplish the goals outlined in its Recovery Friendly Workplace Strategic Plan.

## **Increased Community Engagement and Outreach**

In an effort to increase awareness and reduce stigma around mental health and substance use, MHAS staff hosted and participated in a variety of community outreach efforts throughout 2021. MHAS distributed resources at the following locations/events:

In addition, MHAS staff increased awareness of resources and provided support for multiple entities with a variety of targeted outreach initiatives focused on strengthening and supporting Huron County employees in their workplaces. These targeted outreaches included delivering stress balls, resource bags, personalized java

jackets for redeemable drink purchases at local coffee shops, travel coffee mugs, and wellness folders that included a self-care plan, wellness challenges, local mental health and substance use provider information, support group lists, stress management strategies, coping skills, etc.

MHAS staff continues to increase community engagement through the implementation of bi-monthly email newsletters and press releases to Norwalk Ohio News, Norwalk Reflector, Willard Times-Junction, and the New London Record. The purpose of this outreach is to increase transparency and provide information and resources regarding local behavioral health services while continuing to educate the community and reduce stigma.

## **Huron County Recovery Walk**

MHAS hosted its first Annual Huron County Recovery Walk in September 2021. MHAS had an estimated 64 people attend and participate in the walk. The event began with registration at 9am when participants could show up, check in to receive their free t-shirt and a resource bag from MHAS. Participants could also browse the other resource tables from organizations throughout the community that partner with MHAS such as Oriana House LLC, NAMI Huron County, Firelands Counseling & Recovery Services, United Fund, Huron County Prevention Coalition, Family Life Counseling, Let's Get Real, and the Huron County Department of Job & Family Services. In addition to the organizations who had tables at the event, MHAS had other community sponsors which included: the Huron County Commissioners, Huron County Sheriff's Office, Huron County Public Health, Huron County Family & Children First Council, Fisher Titus, Mercy Health, Huron County Probate Court, OhioGuidestone, and New London Police Department.

Participants walked an identified route around the Norwalk Reservoir (estimated 1.4 miles) that was lined with signs highlighting what recovery means and signs that showed specific organizations that support recovery efforts in our county. After the walk was complete, lunch was provided by MHAS and water was provided by Fisher Titus. Those in attendance then had the opportunity to listen to four individuals share their stories of recovery. Matt McClester, Violet Burgan, Lynn Burgan, and Stephanie Mejia shared their journeys of how they found recovery and their videos can be found on the MHAS Facebook page.

MHAS plans on hosting another recovery walk in September 2022. MHAS's goal is to create an annual Recovery Walk event that will be held in different parts of the county each year in an effort to continue spreading the message that there is hope, there is help, and recovery is possible.

## **Resource Bags**

MHAS staff created resource bags to distribute throughout the county to increase awareness of available resources and supports. ## Don't Give Up Movement

MHAS continues the “Don't Give Up” movement that began in 2020. The goal of the movement is to remind people that they are not alone and to offer hope and inspiration to those who are struggling. MHAS has since updated the signs to include the Board's newest trauma informed community initiative slogan, “Hope. Healing. Recovery. Together We Overcome.” The signs are free of charge to community members and available for pickup at the MHAS office.





## **Increased Prevention Services and Supports**

The Huron County MHAS Board received the Strategic Prevention Framework - Partnerships for Success (SPF-PFS) grant in partnership with Sandusky, Seneca, and Wyandot Counties. The purpose of this grant program is to prevent the onset and reduce the progression of substance abuse and its related problems while strengthening prevention capacity and infrastructure at the community level. The program is intended to address underage drinking and marijuana use among persons aged 9 to 20.

Funding from the grant is to be used to increase prevention infrastructure in Huron County. MHAS is utilizing the funding to increase prevention services and supports in Huron County by increasing capacity in one of our local agencies, the Huron County Family and Children First Council (HCFCFC), which now serves as the county's primary prevention organization. HCFCFC will serve as a hub for prevention services in the county and will lead many prevention initiatives including the Prevention Coalition, the Developmental Assets Program, Experiential Learning programs, Handle with Care, and school-based programs throughout the county.

## **School Collaboration**

MHAS has worked to increase collaboration with Huron County school districts with the goal of identifying the needs of youth in Huron County and working collectively to develop and implement solutions to meet identified needs. The MHAS Board partnered with local schools on the SPF-PFS grant which will include administering the OHYES! survey to Huron County youth, helping us to identify what their unique needs are from their point of view. This information will be used to drive decisions around youth centered services throughout the county. Additional collaborative efforts include the creation of a suicide prevention plan to support and assist students in coping with the loss of a peer by suicide, working collectively to meet deliverables for OhioMHAS's K-12 funding, sharing resources, and providing support.

## **Women's Recovery Housing**

MHAS was awarded a capital funding grant from OhioMHAS to help fund the purchase and renovation of a property which will be used as a women's recovery home. The property is located in Norwalk and will house up to 8 women in recovery from substance use disorder. The mission of this project is to help individuals who are seeking recovery from substance use disorders become productive members of their community by providing housing and additional supports.

The recovery house will promote recovery and resiliency for the women who reside there by providing an environment that is free from mind-altering substances such as drugs and alcohol and offering support services to assist residents on their journey of sobriety. Many of the women who will reside at the residence have not only endured addiction but have also potentially faced additional challenges such as abuse, trauma, or mental illness. This facility will provide a safe and stable environment that will allow the residents to process and work through those challenges and hardships without the use of substances, offering support as they rebuild their lives. In addition, this facility will help residents gain the skills necessary for recovery and establish a strong, sober support network that can help them overcome their personal challenges and help them achieve long term sobriety.

## **Trauma Informed Community**

The goal of the initiative is to shift the conversation from "what is wrong with a person?" to "what happened to the person?", creating a more empathetic community where barriers and stigma are reduced, and people can find hope, healing, and recovery. We plan to accomplish this through increased education and awareness of the negative impact of unaddressed trauma which impacts numerous aspects of our community including mental

health and substance use, physical health, workforce, and the economy. This initiative, with the slogan of “Hope. Healing. Recovery. Together We Overcome.”, includes a variety of community organizations such as social services, advocacy, law enforcement, criminal justice, and schools.



### **Huron County Wellness App**

Huron County Wellness is a free, easy-to-use mobile app that offers quick access to behavioral health and wellness resources for everyone in Huron County, Ohio. The app features stress-management and self-care tools, listings for professional behavioral health services, information on mental health and substance use issues, tools specific to youth, and links to other local wellness resources. Many times, when in need of help or support, our only option is to blindly search Google, hoping to find what we are looking for. This wellness app was created to help eliminate the search and directly connect you with the services and supports you need. The Huron County Wellness app is now available to download for free through Google Play and Apple's App Store.

### **Stepping Up**

On May 6, 2021, the Huron County Commissioner's passed a resolution declaring Huron County a Stepping Up county. The Stepping Up Initiative is a national movement to provide counties with the tools they need to develop cross-system, data-driven strategies that can lead to measurable reductions in the number of people with mental illnesses and co-occurring disorders in jails. The Initiative provides a structured action plan, and the Huron County Stepping Up Collaborative will track the following four key measures to determine success: reducing the number of people with mental illnesses booked into the county jail, increasing connections to treatment, reducing the length of time spent in jail, and reducing recidivism.

Huron County Stepping Up Collaborative members include Bellevue Municipal Court, Huron County Board of Commissioners, Family Life Counseling & Psychiatric Services, Firelands Counseling and Recovery Services, Fisher Titus Medical Center, Huron County Board of Mental Health and Addiction Services, Huron County Coroner, Huron County Court of Common Pleas, Huron County Probate and Juvenile Court, Huron County Sheriff's Office, Let's Get Real, Inc., Mercy Health Willard Hospital, NAMI of Huron County, Norwalk Municipal Court, Ohio State Highway Patrol- Norwalk Patrol Post 39, and Oriana House, Inc.

## Quick Response Team (QRT)

The QRT team provides confidential help for opioid overdose survivors by connecting them to treatment & recovery support services. Overdose reports are submitted by local law enforcement organizations and 911 twice a week. Upon receiving the overdose reports, the QRT team will visit with the survivor and/or family and friends at their residence. The team will provide local treatment and recovery resources to the survivor and/or family and friends, encouraging the survivor to seek treatment. If the survivor wants treatment, they will be connected with a treatment provider and transported, if needed. If the survivor is not interested in treatment at that time, a peer recovery supporter will continue to follow up with them, offering support and resources.

The Huron County QRT Team includes the following organizations: Let's Get Real, Inc., Huron County Board of Mental Health and Addiction Services, Family Life Counseling & Psychiatric Services, Firelands Counseling & Recovery Services, Oriana House, Inc., Norwalk Police Department, Huron County Sheriff's Office, New London Police Department, Wakeman Police Department, Monroeville Police Department, and Plymouth Police Department.

## Project DAWN

Through the Ohio Overdose Prevention Network grant, Let's Get Real, Inc. partnered with Project DAWN to provide training and free naloxone kits at their walk-in peer center located at 2 Oak Street in Norwalk. A prescription is not necessary to receive training or to pick up the medication. Anyone can pick up a kit and get trained. Whether you are caring for someone that uses opioids to manage pain, know someone with an opioid addiction, or someone who uses other substances, having naloxone can help save a life.

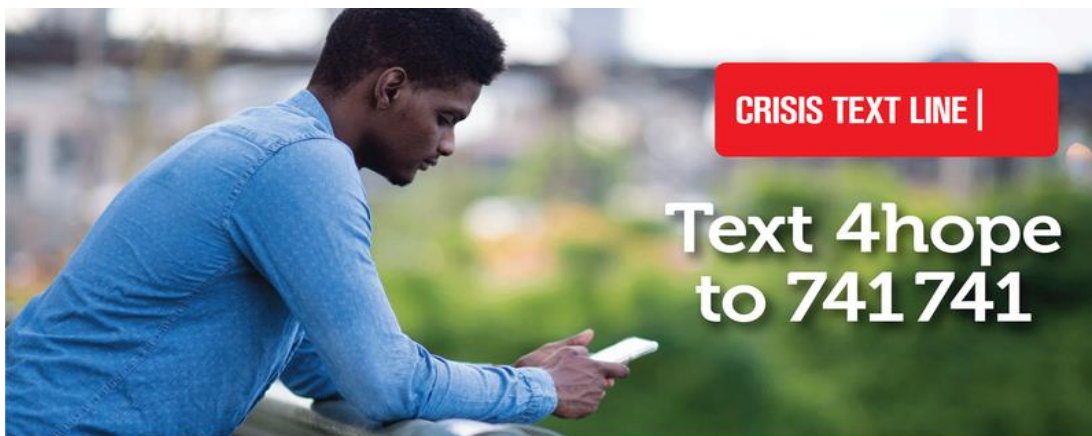

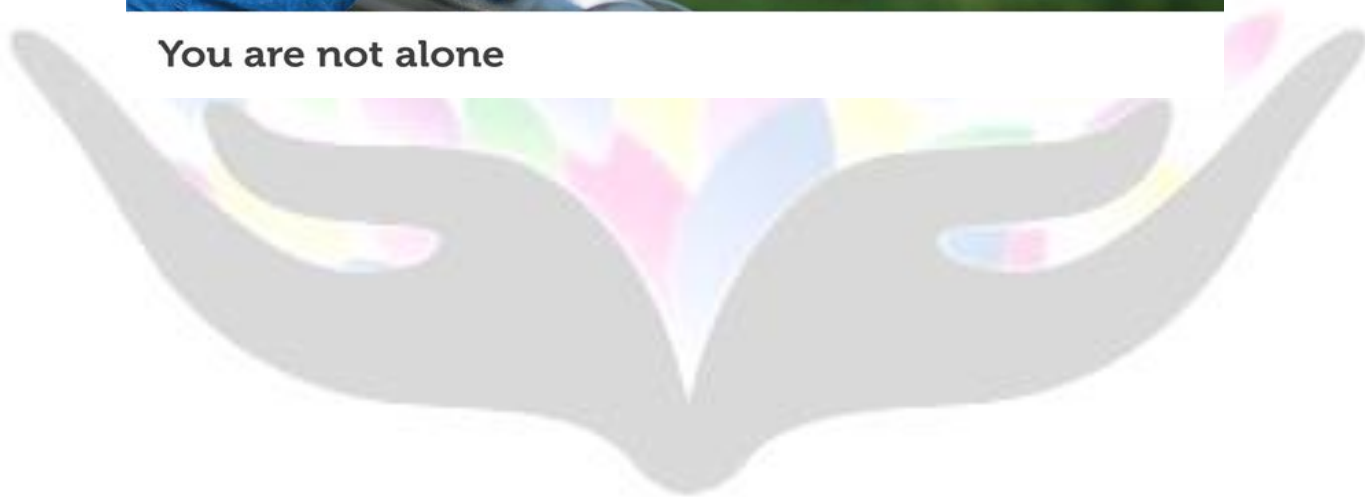

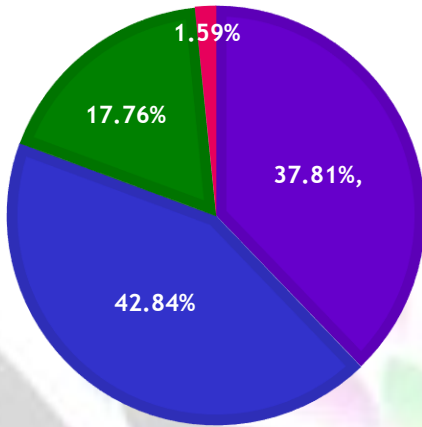

■ Local Levy Funds            ■ Other

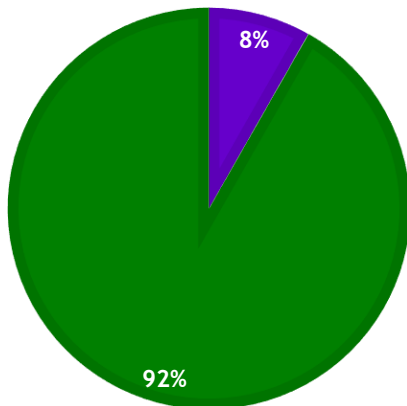
