Huron County Youth Resources

These resources are designed to support youth resiliency, anti-bullying, and general supports available.

Local Supports and Services

Reach Our Youth (ROY) is a one-to-one mentoring program that matches volunteers with local children in Huron County who need a role model & extra friend in life. Many of the youth are in need of a good role model and an extra friend to share life's experiences. ROY aims to help youth grow into well-adjusted adults who contribute positively to their community. We do this by matching caring volunteers with a child who needs some extra attention. Those volunteers meet with their mentee once a week and are encouraged to form a supportive friendship with the youths, as opposed to modifying the youth's behavior or character.

- Requirements for youth: Must be age 6-17 and reside in Huron County, Ohio

<u>Enrichment Centers for Huron County offer the Age Exchange program</u>. Age Exchange is an intergenerational program that brings senior volunteers and youth together, for the purpose of enhancing the quality of life for both groups. Through the activities during each session, the senior volunteers share their time and talents with the children, while the children add value to the lives of the seniors. Senior volunteers are paired individually with youth, allowing for one-on-one attention that youth may not receive in other settings.

The Age Exchange program addresses the following:

- Mental and Emotional Support
- Positive Role Models
- Substance Abuse Awareness
- Individual Attention and Group Participation

How youth are enrolled: program coordinator works with the schools to select children that have challenging situations and may be at risk of exposure to substance abuse.

Locations: the Age Exchange program is available for Norwalk City School District and Willard City School District

<u>OhioGuidestone's Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation Program</u> (ECMH-C) can provide on-site support for challenging behaviors and social emotional concerns. As a solution-oriented program, their consultants can help you overcome these energy-consuming problems and return your focus to facilitating student learning and social emotional growth instead of behavior management.

Services available:

 Classroom Consultation Service focuses on the entire classroom and develops solutions to students' behavioral and social emotional problems faced by your teachers and staff. This includes child and classroom observation, assessment, and intervention planning, and staff support for group behavior management through modeling, coaching and other methods of intervention. This program is provided over an 8-week period, and the consultant spends up to 4 hours per week in your classroom.

• Family-Centered Consultation is designed to help individual children with challenging behaviors and social emotional concerns with participation of the family unit. The consultant spends up to 12 hours spread over 6 sessions with the family to develop solutions and provide linkages and referrals.

Services are available to all Huron County school districts at no cost to the district; services may be virtual or in-person. Call 844.622.5564 for more information.

PROSPER. The Providing Resources and Opportunities Sustaining Prevention and Education for Resilience (PROSPER) coalition is made up of individuals from the community, representatives from local social services organizations, elected officials, and community leaders. PROSPER strives to support, empower, and advocate for the youth and families of Huron County by building resilience, promoting mental health wellness, and preventing substance abuse through collaborative strategies and education. PROSPER oversees multiple prevention programs including Developmental Assets, Start Talking, Be Present, Stomp Out Bullying, etc.

<u>Huron County Family and Children First Council</u>. The purpose of the Family & Children First Council is to streamline and coordinate existing publicly funded services to help families seeking assistance for their children. This initiative is a partnership of government agencies and community organizations committed to improving the well-being of children and their families. We evaluate and prioritize services, fill service gaps where possible, invent new approaches to achieve better results, and ensure ongoing input from a broad representation of the community.

SERVICE COORDINATION

- Basic Service Coordination: A process where immediate daily living needs are identified and resources are
 provided by the Service Coordinator to assist with those needs. The process encourages them to make
 helpful, caring connections in the community.
- Team-Based Service Coordination: A process which develops and carries out plans for children, individuals, and their families who have complex needs or need immediate assistance to identify resources for daily living needs. Families who have used traditional services may find Team-Based Service Coordination helpful because it brings all supporting agencies together to assist the family. The Services Coordination process ensures that services are focused on the needs of the individual and his or her family by making referrals to appropriate agencies and aligning services/community supports.

HIGH-FIDELITY WRAPAROUND

• The wraparound process is a way to improve the lives of children with complex needs or Multi-System Youth (MSY) and are typically involved with multiple agencies within the county for supports and services (DJFS/MHAS/Behavioral Health/School Intervention/Juvenile Court, etc.). It is not a program or a type of service, but a team-based planning process used to develop plans of care that are individualized, and based on the strengths and culture of the children and their family. The plan is NEEDS-DRIVEN rather than service-driven, and includes a team of people that support the youth, including formal (professionals) and informal (family & community members) supports.

D.A.R.E. is a comprehensive K-12 prevention education program taught in thousands of schools in America, as well as many other countries. Taught by highly trained law enforcement officers, D.A.R.E. Education Programs deliver science/evidence-based curricula that teach students good decision-making skills that will help them lead safe and healthy lives and cope with high-risk circumstances including drugs, alcohol, violence, bullying, and internet safety.

<u>Family Life Counseling</u> offers comprehensive mental health and addiction outpatient services for adults and youth, including assessments, counseling, and case management services. School-based counseling and prevention services are also offered. Clients may be referred or self-admit. FLC accepts all payer sources.

<u>Firelands Counseling & Recovery Services</u> offers mental health services for all ages and comprehensive programs for substance abuse, psychiatric services, vocational rehabilitation, educational programs and crisis intervention including a 24-hour crisis line 800-826-1306. Clients may be referred or self-admit. Most insurances are accepted. Sliding fee scale is available.
